Information for Bo Chickly

The Beagles were the most successful band of the 80's. The band was led by Bo Chickly and Len Dry, who had the proverbial love-hate relationship often found in rock bands. In 1987, The Beagles had an acrimonious split, pledging never to play together again, except perhaps in rock-n-roll heaven.
